### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 1

The institute adheres to the norms of regulatory councils (PCI, AICTE) and Biju Patnaik University of Technology (BPUT), Rourkela, Odisha. The institute ensures adherence to the university academic calendar. Institution should emphasize on effective curriculum planning and delivery by various means. Principal is dean of faculty of pharmacy of BPUT for the period of six years. Academic documentation process needs to be streamlined. The Institute organizes training program and industrial tour. The Undergraduate students carry out project and industrial/Hospital training as per curriculum. M. Pharm students undergo one-year project work in the institute or Industry as a part of curriculum. The institute adopts continuous evaluation system which is transparent. The institute has constituted committees for gender sensitization, sexual harassment and anti-ragging committee. Participation of students in social activities like health camp, blood donation camp, plantation activity, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Ek Bharat Sresta Bharat, cancer awareness program is visible. The institute also celebrates World Pharmacy Day and National Pharmacy week. Students are encouraged to participate in various competitions arranged by the institutes in Odisha.

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 2

The academic calendar is prepared at the commencement of the academic session and provides the information pertaining to examination. Induction program for the new entrants is a regular feature. Experiential learning opportunities are provided to students to complement their class room learning and to enhance their intellectual capacity in problem solving. Participative mode of teaching learning is adopted through student centric methods such as project-based learning, evidence based learning and self-directed learning. Fifteen faculty members have been recognized as Ph.D. supervisor by the affiliating University. ICT enabled teaching learning is promoted through the use of simulation software like X-pharmacology, Argoss lab, Hex, and Discover studio. Various modules, recent topics and certification courses can be added to teach beyond syllabus and to reduce the gap in industry and academic. The Online educational resources developed by the faculty members for benefit of the students. However, there is need to measure the outcome of student centric learning methods. Continuous internal evaluation is conducted and it is transparent. A grievance redressal mechanism exists. Automation of internal assessment examination system has to be initiated. The institute has defined Course Outcomes (COs) for all the courses. The POs and COs are disseminated to all the stakeholders through the website and other documents, however effective outcome-based education system need to be implemented. Systematic efforts have to be made for the implementation of assessment and attainment of outcomes for each teaching -leaning and evaluation process. The teaching learning and assessment processes of the institution are aligned with the stated learning *outcomes, but need use assessments* tools for systematic evaluation of the outcomes.

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 3

The institute has been selected as a host institute by ministry of micro small and medium enterprise (MSMEs), Government of India for the establishment of entrepreneurial and management development of MSMEs through incubators under CLCS-TUS in April-2021. However, the institute has to take initiative to develop incubation center focusing on activities such as; development of the products and processes related to pharmaceutical care including some cosmetic preparations. Research presentation of students and staff at national and international platform can be encouraged through inculcating research and innovative culture among students and staff of the institute. Institute does not have any financial assistance for research from any national, international agency or the affiliating University. The institute is recognized as Nodal Centre of Research (NCR) by the affiliating University. The faculty has published their research findings in the journal of repute in the last two years. Participation of the students and faculties in the various activities such as World Aids Day, International Pharmacist Day, National Pharmacy Week, World Environment Day, International Women's Day, Librarian's Day, Unata Bharat Abhiyan, World Blood Donation Day and Sanitizer is visible. The institute has organized social camp, health camps to educate the people about their hygiene, sanitation, literacy and various health issues in the surrounding villages.

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 4

The institute has adequate infrastructure facilities viz. ICT enabled class rooms, well equipped laboratories, seminar hall, central instrumentation laboratory; CPECSA approved animal House, and separate CADD laboratory for computer-aided design. Adequate space has been provided to the library with sufficient number of text books and titles. The J.K. Memorial Library has an adequate collection of e-books, e-journals and dissertation of Post graduate students. Separate section for reference books is available. A collection of rare books, latest edition of reference books and pharmacopeias for enrichment of library is desired. Central subscription of online database like DELNET to provide e-books and e-journals is available. The library is automated and uses NIC Open Access Library Software. Regular updating of computers needs to be done and recruitment of qualified IT person to facilitate continuous maintenance and repair of the same is desired.

The labs having equipment in working condition as per the requirement of statutory bodies. One class room is equipped with smart board and five classrooms are available with audio visual facilities. Documented policy for maintenance of instruments and physical facilities is not visible. Annual maintenance contract of sophisticated instruments is essential. Sewage treatment plant (STP) is available for recycling of water. Basic amenities like banks, shopping center and post office exist in the campus. Solar panels are installed on the street lights in the campus.

Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in inter-college competitions, however inter-state, national level participation should be encouraged. Institute has constituted various committees such as anti-ragging committees, sexual harassment and women cell, however the constitution of the committees should be in accordance with the norms and guidelines of the respective regulatory bodies. A registered alumni association came in to existence in the October 2017. Alumina contribution is limited to career counseling and professional development

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 6

The organizational structure is available. The statutory bodies and committees function as per the guidelines of the affiliating University. Participative practice is in place with academic and administrative autonomy; however, it needs to be decentralized. Teaching faculty is represented in the academic and administrative committees of the institute with minor representation of students. Periodic meetings are conducted but each meeting has to be recorded. A strategic planning of the institute is in place. Good documentation practice needs to be adopted by the institute.

The employees are covered under group insurance. Facility of EPF, gratuity as well medical facilities is available to all employees. The faculty members are encouraged for professional development through participation in FDP, attain higher qualification, however financial support to attend national and international conferences for students and staff is needed for the further encouragement. Self-appraisal system of teaching



and non-teaching staff exists, however policy for promotion needs to be framed. Service book of all permanent staff are maintained. The accounts are maintained and regularly audited by external auditor as per the statutory requirements. An Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been established, but academic and administrative audits have to be undertaken periodically.

The sources of income are well defined. The college council actively involves in the mobilization and sustenance of funds by planning judiciously budget requirements on capital expenditure and for other expenses.

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 7

The institute has Internal Complaint Committee (ICC). The ICC has to organize regularly various different activities on different issues related to the same. There is no reported incidence of sexual harassment till date.

Management of degradable and non-degradable is in place, but animal and bio- hazardous waste should be disposed as per CPCSEA and other regulatory guidelines. E-waste management initiatives are visible by distributing older versions of computers to rural schools, but systematic documented policy of e-waste management is needed. The waste water is recycled (sewerage treatment plant). Green audit and energy audit need to be done.

The cultural committee organizes a number of activities to name a few Utkal Divas and International Mother Language Day. Faculty members and students undertake Rashtriya Ekta Diwas to uphold the unity, integrity and security of the nation and also organize functions on birth anniversary of great Indian personalities like Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam. The institute celebrates religious festivals, including Saraswati Puja, Ganesh Puja, Biswakarma Puja, etc., Freshers Day, Founders Day, Teachers Day and Pharmacist Day are also celebrated during the calendar year.

Best Practices:

1. Availability and retention of well qualified faculty in the institution.

Distinctiveness: First institution of the state received accreditation for B.Pharm program from NBA for a period of 2017 to 2020.

4. Remote access to the library is lacking.
5. Adoption of Innovative techniques and teaching beyond syllabus is required.
6. Systematic documentation of the activities needed.
7. Implementation of assessment and attainment of outcomes for each teaching -learning and evaluation process required

**Opportunities:**

1. Telemedicine activities can be initiated.
2. Enhancement of IQAC activities.
3. Scope for user friendly facilities for the differentially abled people.
4. Active participation of alumni in the development activities of the institutions need to be encouraged.
5. Establishment of center for pharmacovigilance center.
6. Introduction of inter disciplinary and twinning programs

**Challenges:**

1. Mobilization of grants for research from national and international funding agencies
2. Attracting students from other states.
3. Technology driven teaching and learning.
4. Industry-institute collaborations due to few pharma industry in the state of Odisha
